FOREWORD



Thanks for downloading this FREE interactive travel guide. You've made an excellent choice if you plan on **GETTING OFF THE BEATEN TRACK** in (LOCATION). Before you delve into the content of this travel guide, please take a few minutes to read this foreword. It outlines how to make the best use of the information contained within.

First-hand experience: This travel guide has been put together using first-hand experience gained from traveling to, and exploring, all the locations presented within. The information and photos featured in my travel guides, have been collated over years of putting boots on the ground. There is no second-hand information, or information which is plagiarized from other travel sources, within this guide. Every cave, waterfall, river, viewpoint, jungle trail, temple site, guesthouse and restaurant presented, or promoted, I have been to and seen and/or experienced myself.

Getting off the beaten track: The primary focus of my travel guides is **ADVENTURE TRAVEL** (and activities) to locations which are non-mainstream tourist destinations. As an example, there is no information for the mainstream tourist locations of **INDONESIA** (except as transit hub's before heading off to a more remote location) listed in this travel guide. As such, the information in this guide is directed towards travelers (not tourists) who

are keen for a bit of adventure - caving, climbing, jungle trekking, kayaking - in an off the beaten track location, of South East Asia. If these types of activities aren't to your liking, then this travel guide won't be much use to you. There's no information in here about the party towns in South East Asia.

Budget travel: Knowing the importance of making the most of your hard-earned currency, my travel links ([12GO ASIA](#)) and accommodation links ([AGODA](#)) are predominantly budget oriented. They provide a range of options for getting to a central hub, or base, from which you can make your daily explorations.

Independent sightseeing: Instead of going on group tours, I strongly promote the idea of renting your own vehicle (car or motorbike) and venturing out yourself. To help you get to the exact location, there's always a [GOOGLE MAPS](#) link to show the route from a hub (hotel or guesthouse) to the sightseeing attraction. If there's a local tour operator offering excellent adventure type tours, or activities, I'll provide links to their website. A good example of a great adventure tour operator is [GREEN DISCOVERY LAOS](#), who offer excellent caving, kayaking and trekking tours throughout Laos.

The Table of Contents: This is page four of the travel guide and has a sequential list of sections, which you can go to directly by clicking on the **GREEN** numbered tab.

It's Time To Get Off The Beaten Track



BALI - GENERAL INFORMATION

About: This magical little island, in the heart of Indonesia, continues to be one of the world's hot spot tourist destinations. What started out fifty years ago as an off the beaten track destination for surfers and backpackers, is now a global mecca for slow travelers, digital nomads, and wellness seekers. Take it as a given that if you go there during the peak season (April - September) you'll find it to be very crowded. Particularly the more well known areas of Kuta, Legian, Ubud, Cangu, and Balangan. To escape the crowds, try staying in the more sedate SANUR, on the East Coast.

Getting There: Bali has direct flights to Ngurah Rai Airport (Denpasar) from all over the world. Click the following link to see your travel options to Bali:



Note: Tourists entering Bali have the option of the 60 day tourists e-visa which you can apply for at this Government website: <https://evisa.imigrasi.go.id/> or the 30 day e-voa visa, which you can apply for at this government website: https://evisa.imigrasi.go.id/web/application_voa



If you complete the e-voa visa on-line, passing immigration is simply a matter of scanning your passport. Once you clear through immigration, you'll be required to fill out an on-line customs declaration on one of the dedicated computers near the baggage carousels. **Note:** This must be done to clear through customs.

Taxis: The best taxi service from the airport is the BLUEBIRD fleet. The price of a transfer from the Airport to Sanur is approx. 200k IDR (Indonesian Rupiah). If you've got pre-booked accommodation, the hotel or guesthouse may offer you a pick-up service. The price for a private transfer is normally about 250k IDR.

Accommodation: There are hundreds of hotel and guesthouse options in Sanur. However, if you're planning a trip in the peak season, make sure to book your accommodation well in advance to avoid disappointment. Use AGODA or BOOKING.COM to secure your room before you arrive.

Budget Accommodation: An excellent choice is ENNY'S HOMESTAY, which is centrally located along the main tourist street in Sanur. They have clean, comfortable a/c rooms, with hot water, for 200k IDR per night. **Click the following link for booking inquiries:**

Eat and Drink: Situated next door to Enny's Homestay, the PARADISE BALI CAFE/RESTAURANT is an excellent option for western food and coffee. The doors open at 6.30 am for those wanting an early breakfast or caffeine hit. Additionally, there's a well equipped gym on the premises for personalized workouts and training. To relieve any aches and pains after a day's outing, they've also got an excellent recovery area on the third floor with a plunge pool, ice bath, and sauna.

Local Dining: Balinese food is quite tasty, perhaps not as spicy as Thai, and if you eat at local warungs, it's cheap. Warungs don't attract the 17 % of additional tax and service charges that the tourist restaurants are required to tack on to the bill. Meal prices at tourist restaurants are comparable to Thailand. An excellent local food restaurant (Padang Food) is the SARI BUNDO restaurant. **Click the following link for the location:**

Getting Around: The two most popular options are by rented motorbike, or bicycle. There are rental outlets all along the main tourist street of Sanur. Daily rental rates are normally around the 100k - 150k IDR for motorbikes, around 50k - 100k for bicycles. If you're not keen on negotiating the hectic traffic on the roads, on a motorbike or bicycle, Grab motorbike taxis are readily available. **Note:** The PARADISE BALI CAFE has a good stock of motorbikes and bicycles for rent.

Note of Caution: The primary problem with Bali is the roads have not been upgraded to cope with tourist development. Although there's a tollway linking the airport to both sides of the island, most of the roads (through the main tourist areas) are little more than single lane (each way) tracks from yesteryear. The roads are constantly choked with cars, trucks, motorbikes, and bicycles all dodging and weaving around traffic parked along one sides of the road.

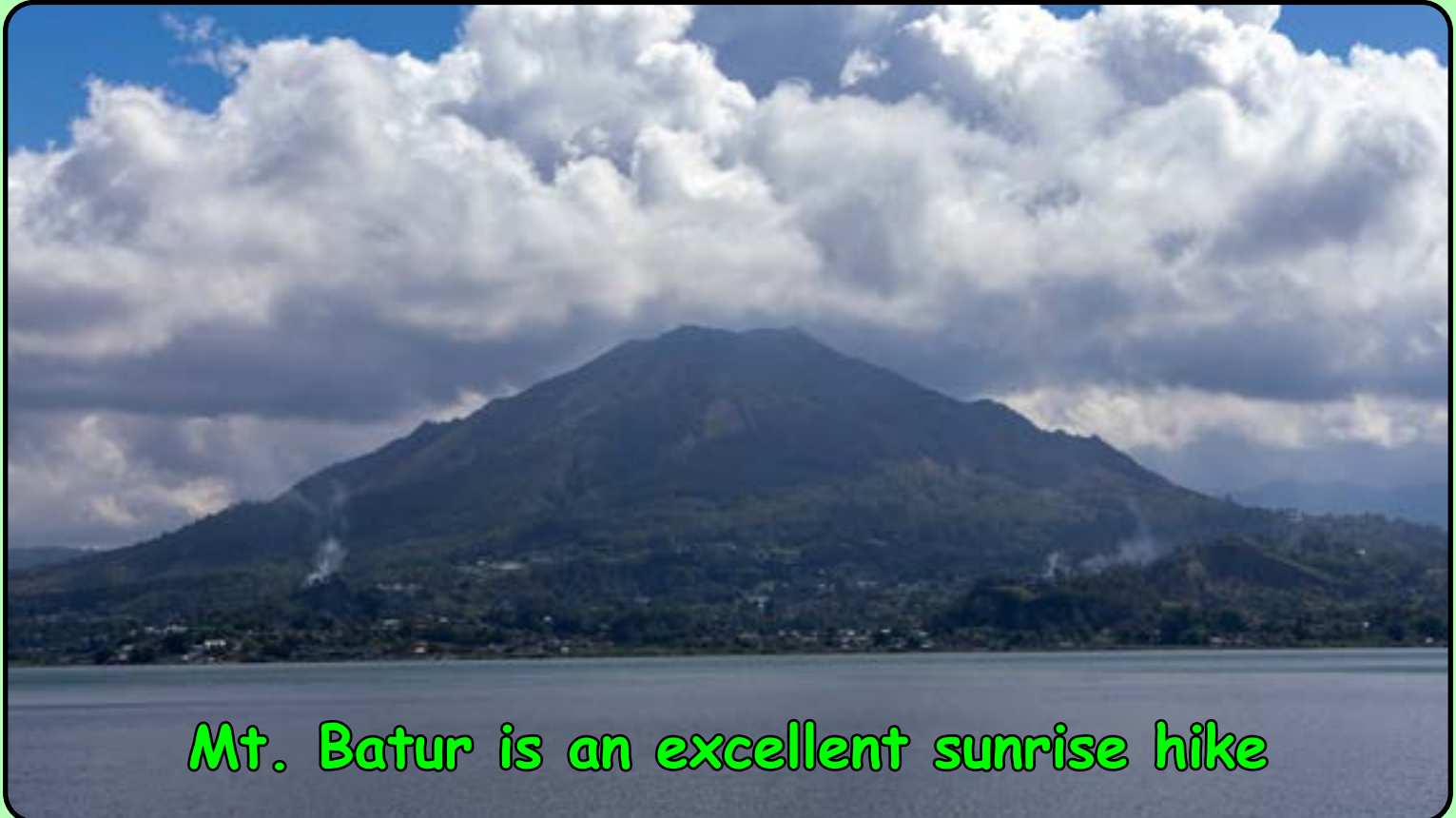
Sightseeing Tours: There are hundreds of sightseeing options and activities available around the island of Bali. SURFING, SCUBA DIVING, VOLCANO SUNRISE HIKES, JUNGLE TREKKING, WATERFALL TOURS, ETC. If you're staying in one of the major tourist centers, such as Sanur, getting to some of these sightseeing locations can involve lengthy travel time.



Rented Bicycles

If you don't want to take the risk of doing it yourself (rented motorbike) on Bali's roads, there are many excellent travel/trekking companies available to choose from. Information about many of the tours can be found at travel booths in the popular tourist areas. A good choice for volcano sunrise hikes, jungle trekking, and waterfall tours is BALI JUNGLE TREKKING. **Click the following link for more information:**

SIGHTSEEING - MOUNT BATUR AREA

Lava Field Jeep Tour: This is an interesting tour which takes you through the lava Fields of BATUR CRATER. All inclusive tours can be arranged directly with local companies which will pick you up from your hotel and take you up to the village at the crater rim. From there you'll transfer into a jeep for the ride down into the crater and then an off road excursion through the lava fields, at the base of Mount Batur. **Note:** Mount Batur is a popular location for sunrise hikes. **Contact the following tour company for trip details and bookings: Mr. Made. +62 81337200994**

The Volcanic Sand Hills: The tour through the lava fields includes a visit to the volcanic sand hills, located bottom slope of the mountain. The parking area for the sand hills, is where the sunrise hikes begin. You can see the trail heading up the mountain from the parking area. To get a fantastic view over the surrounding terrain, and the crater lake, hike up to the top of the big sandhill next to the parking area. **Note:** Even though it's only a 100 meter elevation, the loose volcanic sand makes it a tougher undertaking. **Click the following link to see a highlights video of the lava field tour:**



The Lava Field: This area is approximately two km further downhill from the sand hills. The terrain is mostly flat with jagged lava rocks throughout. The jeep follows an established track through the middle of the lava field and stops in center, for sightseers to get photos and video. There's no high point in the lava field to climb up on to. Most sightseers will stand on the cab of the jeeps to get an elevated look at the surroundings. **Note:** The lava field tour is normally not part of the Mt. Batur Sunrise Hike.



SIGHTSEEING - TERUNYAN CEMETERY

About: This sightseeing location may not be for everyone as there are usually several decomposing corpses at the site. Additionally, there's a pile of skulls which are reminiscent of the Killing Fields in Phnom Penh. Simply said, it's not for the squeamish. Another barrier to getting to this site is the cost of the boat ride across the lake. The prices are seriously expensive for the twenty minute ride each way. If you're in a group it's doable. But as a solo traveler, the 800k IDR fee is something which needs to be considered before handing over your cash. Is the cemetery worth looking at? I would say that if you're not doing a YouTube Video, then probably not. It's a small site at which you'll probably be there for no longer than fifteen minutes. To try and bolster the trip, they'll take you to Terunyan Village first, to look at the Hindu Temple. The people who live there are descended from the original inhabitants of Bali. What was notable is their larger stature than the Balinese people you see around the tourist areas of the island. **Note:** The departure point for the boats is directly across the road from the ALFAMART LAKEVIEW convenience store - **Google Maps** below:

KINTAMANI TO UBUD BICYCLE TOUR

About: The Kintamani to Ubud Bicycle Tour is an excellent slow sightseeing experience which takes you through some amazing mountain landscapes of Bali. The tour starts at Kintamani Village, on the rim of the BATUR CALDERA, and follows lane ways and small roads all the way to UBUD. The best time to do this bicycle tour is between May to October, the dry season. During the rainy season, November to April, there's a higher probability of being hit by a downpour. Additionally, during the peak rainy season months (January and February) the terrain towards the upper part of the ride (Kintamani) is often fogged in and can be quite cold. This makes sightseeing a bit hit and miss, trying to time it between rain fronts and a misty landscape.

Doing the tour: The best way to do this tour is an organised trip, with a guide. A good recommendation is to use a tour company which specializes in cycling tours, such as BALI BIKE - BAIK TOUR, and who knows the routes from Kintamani to Ubud. **Click on the following link for more information:**

Getting There: As mentioned, the starting point is the top of the volcanic caldera which over looks LAKE BATUR.

If you're staying in areas outside Ubud, you'll need to arrange transportation to the UBUD EBIKE TOUR office. The best option for this is GRAB or BLUEBIRD TAXI'S. Once you arrive at the BALI BIKE OFFICE, in Ubud, you'll transfer into one of their vehicles, with the guide and the bicycles, for the drive up to the rim of the caldera. Note: The starting point is next to the LAKE VIEW RESTAURANT. Before starting the descent, you're given the option of having a coffee in the restaurant and checking out the view over the lake.

KINTAMANI TO UBUD BICYCLE TOUR

The Route: The route, for the majority of the descent to Ubud, tends to stick to smaller lane-ways and off the busier roads. This is excellent in terms of rider safety and avoids the potential risk of collision with a vehicle on the narrow, congested roads in the area. The ride usually lasts about two hours and is downhill most of the way to Ubud Village. The scenery on the way is fantastic as the guide leads you along the small lane-ways, which weave through traditional villages and rice paddies on the outer slopes of the mountain.

Ubud: Once you reach Ubud Village, you'll partake of an Indonesian lunch before returning to your hotel. Note: If you've organised your own transport from another area on the island, it's probably a good idea to pay for the round trip. The local taxi drivers will normally wait for you at the tour finish point.

Religion: The predominant religion of Bali is Hinduism. Which is at odds with the rest of Indonesia, where Islam is the overwhelmingly preferred religion. As you travel around the island the influence of Hinduism can be seen everywhere in the architecture of the temples which dot the landscape. For the Balinese who have money, their homes are built to include this Hindu architecture. Many houses have Garuda, or Hanuman, styled statues flanking the entry gates.

If you spend some time talking with a local, who speaks reasonable, it soon becomes apparent the Hinduism of Bali is infused with a local folk religion. The Balinese spend a lot of time trying to appease the perceived evil spirits. Incense is burned and small banana leaf baskets, with flowers, are placed at the gates of most houses to persuade the evil spirits to become good, before entering. Many of the footpaths around the villages have small flights of stairs to break the flow of the evil spirits along a pathway. To an outsider, this may all seem like superstitions mumbo, jumbo. However, to the Balinese, it's a very serious part of life.

ULUWATU TEMPLE

About: Another excellent outing is a tour to ULUWATU TEMPLE and LOOKOUT. This is a fantastic sightseeing location at the southern tip of Bali and provides some great views along a cliff-line. There's a Hindu temple there and as such, the locals consider this to be an important religious site. **Note:** If you're wearing shorts, you'll be required to put on a sarong before stepping through the gates.

Getting There: Renting a motorbike and riding there yourself is an option if you're on a tight budget. However, if you're staying in Sanur, it can take up to two hours to get to the Uluwatu Temple Car Park. Even though the distance is relatively short (only 31 km) the traffic on the narrow, congested roads can make it a tough drive, particularly coming down the JIMBARAN - ULUWATU ROAD. If you want to avoid the stress of negotiating your way through traffic jams, an easier option is to just hire a local taxi for the round trip. **Click the following link for directions from Sanur:**



Entry Fee: Once you arrive at the Car Park, the staff will let you know if you'll need to rent a sarong to enter the temple grounds. There's also an entry fee of 50,000 IDR for foreigners.



Cliff top pathway: There are two Hindu Temples within the temple grounds, but the main attraction is the 500 pathway which runs along the edge of the cliff line. This pathway provides sight-seers with spectacular views down to the water and along the coast line. The pathway is completely safe with a solid safety barrier along it's entire length.

MOUNT ABANG TREKKING

About: Mount Abang is the second highest peak in Bali. It is located along the Eastern Edge of LAKE BATUR and directly opposite MOUNT BATUR. The trek to the peak is rated as moderate to difficult. This peak sees less tourists than the more popular Mt. Batur due to the arduous nature of the hike. However, the three hour hike to the top is well worth it. The views across to Batur Volcano are spectacular. **Click the following link for the location of Mount Abang:**



Getting There: Regardless of where you're staying in Bali, you'll need to make your way to the MOUNT ABANG TICKET OFFICE to start the hike. If you're staying in Sanur, a good option for transportation is to hire a local taxi for the day to take you to the ticket office/start point. MR. KETUT is highly recommended. He is a knowledgeable driver who speaks good English. His WhatsApp contact is: +62 8174721863. The price for the round trip to the Mt. Abang Ticket Office is 800k IDR (approx. 50 USD). **Click the following link for the location of the Mount Abang Ticket office:**



On-site: The ticket office is located on Google Maps and registration, and entry payment is required before starting the hike. If you're an experienced hiker, and in good shape, then it is possible to make the hike without a guide. However, for less experienced hikers, a guide is recommended. MR. WAYAN is an excellent and knowledgeable local guide with many years' experience hiking Mount Abang. His WhatsApp contact is: +62 85792088467. You can contact Mr. Wayan to arrange a meeting time at the ticket office. **The price for a solo hike is 810k IDR. (50 USD).**

MOUNT ABANG TREKKING

Doing the Hike: There's a map on the back wall of the ticket office which shows the route from the starting point to the summit. The hiking/trail distance is approximately 4.5 km. The elevation is 800 meters. The average time to complete the out and back hike is 6 - 7 hours. Time variation will depend on how long you spend on the summit. The distance from the ticket office to the trail head is approximately two km. Your taxi will transport you to the trail head. **The trail can be divided into three sections:**

The First Section: This is the initial 2 km from the trail head to position one (the first temple). This is relatively flat with a few rises and dips before getting to the start of section two.

The Second Section: After taking drinks break at the first temple location and enjoying the great view across the lake, it's a short distance to the start of what is arguably the toughest section of the ascent. You'll know you're there because the terrain suddenly gets much steeper, and there's a knotted rope laying along the trail. Note: this is more for the descent. Section two is 1.5 km of rugged, potholed trail which will have you breathing hard by the time you arrive at position two (the second temple). To make it even more demanding there's also tree roots protruding into the dirt

track which you need to climb over. At a steady pace it will take approximately one hour to negotiate this second section. The temple at position two is in a beautifully scenic location, which is heavily forested. The trees begin to change from the tropical, broad leaf type to pine. Look closely and you'll see lots of moss growing on the tree trunks. **Click the following link to see a highlights video of the Mount Abang Trek:**

The Third Section: This final one km stretch to the summit, while not as demanding as section two, is challenging due to the mud and slippery surface. Although not quite as steep as section two, you need to take your time with the climb to avoid slipping. There's plenty of handholds along the trail, in the form of protruding tree roots to assist with the ascent.

The Summit: Arriving at the top is a welcome relief after what is quite an arduous three hour ascent. There's also a Balinese stone temple on the summit. Getting clear views across Lake Batur, is a bit hit and miss. It tends to be clearer in the mornings. Conditions tend to cloud over towards midday and into the afternoon. Note: This is a major reason why most hikers opt to do the sunrise hike. However, if you don't want to make the ascent in darkness, a good option is to start at around 06:00 am.

Summary: Mount Abang is a challenging hike. The descent due to the steepness of the upper trail and the mud, is probably more difficult than the ascent. Take a hiking pole to help with balance and avoid slippage. Additionally, use proper hiking shoes with tread for better grip. Finally, if you're not an experienced hiker, use a local guide for a safer experience.

IJEN CRATER BLUE FIRE TOUR

About: MOUNT IJEN is a semi-active volcano located in Eastern Java, approximately 34 km from BANYUWANGI CITY. It's a popular sight-seeing location which attracts many international and local tourists. The primary draw cards are the BLUE FIRE and the SULFUR MINING ACTIVITIES which occur near the CRATER LAKE. A tour to Ijen Crater involves a significant amount of up-hill hiking, and a challenging descent to the crater lake. The hiking component could be classed as moderately challenging. However, what pushes it into the difficult class is the clouds of sulfur fumes which are encountered during the descent to the crater lake. When this is combined with the steep, rocky trail, the difficulty level is significantly increased due to the requirement of wearing a gas mask and goggles. **Note:** Without these two safety items, the local guides will not allow anyone to descend to the crater lake.

Getting There: If you're already in Java, then organizing a tour from Banyuwangi is relatively easy. Simply contact one of the local operators specializing in Ijen Tours. An excellent choice in this regard is IJEN EXPEDITIONS. Their prices are very reasonable, for group or solo, and they have experienced, knowledgeable guides.



From Bali: Ijen expeditions can also organise overnight (24 hours) tours for people staying in Bali. However, due to the small, congested roads in Bali, this option includes a significant amount of travel time. It takes approximately 8 hours each way, including the ferry crossing from Gilimanuk to Banyuwangi. Note: The prices for a tour from Bali are door to door. Pick up time is normally 18:00 (6:00 pm). **Click the following link for booking inquiries:**

Doing the tour: Once you've committed to doing the tour, you'll be given a pick-up time at your hotel. If you're staying in Banyuwangi, this is normally around 23:00 - 23:30. Before heading up to the start point you will be required to do a medical check - blood pressure and resting pulse rate - to determine your fitness for the hike.

On-site: Once you arrive at the Ijen parking area/start point you'll be greeted by your guide for the hike. He will issue you the gas mask and goggles you'll need to complete the outing safely. The parking area/start point also has several small restaurants, where you can buy snacks, coffee, and tea. There's also toilet facilities on site.

The Ascent to The Crater Rim: This is the first stage of the of the tour. **It's a 3.5 km hike to the crater rim:**

- The first 1 km is an easy slope.
- The second 2 km is steeper and more difficult. Near the top the trail narrows and zigzags to the top.
- The final 500 meters is mostly flat going.

At various points along the trail there are rest stops (huts) with seating selling coffee, tea, snacks, and bottled water. For anyone who runs out of energy, or who don't have stamina to complete the hike to the crater rim, transportation in the form of two wheeled carts with seats are



available. Two haulers are assigned to each cart to push and pull you to the top. Note: To be able to see the Blue Fire, the ascent hike normally starts no later than 02:00.

The Crater Rim: The trail along the crater rim is mostly flat going and allows recovery time before the descent into the crater. If the wind is blowing across the crater lake (from the west) you'll already be able to smell the sulfur on the crater rim. If this is the case you'll be asked to don your gas mask before starting the descent. **Note:** If you're only doing the SUNRISE TOUR, you won't make the descent into the crater.

Descent into the Crater: This is the second stage of the tour and, as mentioned, the most challenging. Not the least because you'll be descending in the dark. The trail down to the crater lake is steep and rock strewn. If the sulfur clouds are being blown up the crater face, the challenge goes up significantly, due to the requirement to wear a gas mask and goggles. This requirement impedes vision markedly. Under normal circumstances, the descent to the crater lake will take a minimum of 30 - 40 minutes. **Note:** For additional safety, use a hiking pole during the descent.

At the Crater Lake: The Blue Fire is located at the lowest point of the trail, near the Crater Lake. As mentioned, you can only see this when it's dark (at night). Normally it's not visible after 05:30, when dawn breaks and it begins to get light. The Blue Fire is a product of burning sulfur and at Ijen it looks like a small stream flowing downhill. Getting close getting photos or video is extremely hazardous as toxic sulfur clouds are constantly swirling about in the area. Even if you're wearing a gas mask and goggles, you'll still probably inhale sulfur fumes and have burning eyes. Trying to do this in the dark makes it even more of a challenge because you'll have to turn off your headlamp/flashlight to see the Blue Fire. **Note:** There are only two places in the world where Blue Fire can be seen. One is at Ijen, the other is somewhere in Iceland.

IJEN CRATER BLUE FIRE TOUR

The Sulfur Miners: As soon as it's light, the Sulfur Miners begin their day's work. The sulfur mining area is approximately 50 meters above the Blue Fire zone. You'll need to hike back up the trail to see them at work. The miners have installed piping to funnel the liquid sulfur to a flat area where it is set to a solid mass. Once it is solidified, the miners use crow bars to break it off into manageable chunks. While they're doing this, clouds of toxic sulfur fumes are swirling about everywhere. Once enough of the chunks are stacked up, the miner will then begin loading up his carry baskets. They have two baskets suspended off the end of a long pole, which they support on their shoulders during their long climb up to the crater rim. According to my guide, the combined total weight of these baskets is around 60 - 70 kg. These miners are probably doing one of the world's most hazardous jobs and even though they're wearing gas masks and goggles, the sulfur must eventually take a toll on their health.
